a number of destination choices for our 2020 Corporate Ride. There are areas that we considered in the Bancroft, Pembroke, Barry's Bay area plus we also considered a more local ride - weather dependant of course. We looked at the Mattawa area where we held this event a couple years ago as the location is consistent for snow availability, accommodations and the riding options are excellent. The consensus is

that the Valois in Mattawa, Ontario will be the destination of our 2020 Corporate Ride.

Last year's Corporate Ride for 2019 had originally planned to be in Gravenhurst, Ontario but Mother Nature was not on our side. Our location was changed last minute and we landed in North Bay at the Best Western which is also a very snowmobile friendly destination. Debbie Lackey lead the charge (thanks Deb) in finding the Best Western and the participants all responded by making their last minute reservation changes. Debbie puts a lot of time and effort into planning this event annually and she does an excellent job at it.

Close to 30 riders participated and we had some interesting stories at the end of each day on pre-ride emergen-

The BEAST crew have been working on cy repairs, a blown engine, a blown suspension and equipment recoveries. All in all, only 2 machines did not make the full weekend but even still, all the participants had smiling faces at the end of each day. This is how popular this event is and people look for it year after year. We look forward to the same this year.

> One other thing we will be looking at this year is breaking the participants into smaller groups based on the distance they

would want to ride, length of time they want to be out and riding pace that is comfortable to them. The main goal is to have fun, enjoy being with other people that love snowmobiling and getting together at the end of the day to exchange stories on their experience.

There are several options for sledding:

- #1 Head up via truck and trailer on Thursday evening, to sled on Friday and Saturday, trailer home Sunday
- #2 Head up via truck and trailer early on Friday, to sled Friday afternoon and Saturday, trailer home Sunday
- #3 Head up via truck and trailer Friday, to sled on Saturday, trailer home Sunday
- #4 For any option, extend your trip into the holiday Monday and beyond if desired

Our goal is always to keep hotel costs to a minimal, ensure we have restaurants and services nearby with food preferably on location of the hotel and a cost of around \$150.00 per night or less.

Groomers, Groomers, Groomers–Jim Lackey

During the off-season, the BEAST Exec worked extremely hard at presenting our case to the OFSC Provincial Groomer Fleet Program that it was time for us to receive one of the new groomers from the program. Our 3 current groomers are aging and we need to start now to upgrade our fleet or perform maintenance so we can keep them on the trails and not in the shop.

As part of this process, an extensive list of repairs needed on each unit was compiled and presented to the committee. It was interesting to see that some of our neighbor clubs have older equipment and what they have endured to keep them running. In our case, items such as

new tracks, engine repairs, window replacements, snow blade repairs, heater controls, and radiators have made the list. We are still crunching the numbers but we estimate close to \$35,000 worth of investment is needed to get our fleet ready for this year.

As part of this process, we also looked at the condition of our drag units and documented close to an additional \$15,000 worth of maintenance repairs needed before winter.

While we did not get approved for a new groomer, we were identified as a priority club for the next round and we did receive \$15,000 funds to refurbish one of our groomers. We have also worked on a funding submission to cover the drag repairs at the local UCSR District Level.

For the additional repairs not covered by these funding sources, these will be completed from our own operating budgets set aside for repairs. This is why it is critical to purchase a permit as this is where 100% of our funding to manage all of this work comes from.

Work on these units has started already and we are confident that every piece of equipment will be ready to roll when the trails are ready for grooming.

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BEAST Club Rides - Rob Illingworth

The BEAST will be once again organizing more group rides this season. They will be for all different skill levels to accommodate everyone even younger kids, families, couples and two-up riders. This will be a great opportunity to get out and meet some new people and ride some trails you may have never be on. Most of the rides will be loops that start and return to the same spot to accommodate anyone that needs to trailer. Some rides will have a slower pace with more frequent stops. The pace of each ride will be determined by the size of the group and overall length of the ride.

- A regular weekly night ride for moderate skill riders with a different destination each week.
- A Sunday ride, to a local pan-cake emporium.
- A Saturday ride that will cover a lot of the BEAST trails

and some from trails from other clubs in UCSR District.

• A weekend get away to Mattawa on our annual BEAST Corporate / Club Ride.

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North East Trail Sector - Blaine Johnson

The BEAST North East (NE) consists of trails from Stittsville on the Trans Canada Trail (TCT) (BEAST 200), portions of the A Top Trail from BEAST 200 southeast to the Jock River, BEAST 303 east to Copeland Rd, and E104A (Ashton Station Rd to the TCT trail), and the BEAST 206 (Ashton swamp). Basically the trails are from Stittsville to Carleton Place / Ashton and from Munster to Almonte. In general, the NE is high, dry and the easiest BEAST sector to access for trail work and overall maintenance. On top of that, the A Top trail is the NE's



grooming responsibility end to end within the BEAST. Swamps and creeks largely define the boundaries, especially in the early season. The NE sector trails tend to be the first ones to open and the last ones to close. Great for those sledders that are itching to get out after the first winter storms and for those diehards

that want to get out as late in the season as possible.

From a trail grooming standpoint, all these trails are covered by one 2001 BR180 (which is shared with the South East (SE) sector). We have a seasoned groomer crew, with the bulk of the grooming operations occurring between 8PM and 6AM. This allows time for the trail to setup and ultimately last longer. The NE has an operator scheduled to groom every night of the season. The common factors that prevent a grooming shift are lack of snow, breakdowns, warm weather and rare cases of cold spells.

There are a few updates for 2019/2020. The old BEAST 201 trail (an access trail from Hazeldean Rd in Stittsville to the TCT / BEAST 200) is unfortunately still closed this season. A key landowner is actively working this land and it will not be suitable for snowmobile usage this season. Hopefully this will re-open in future years. The E104A now runs from Ashton out to the TCT trail and the Ashton swamp trail is now the BEAST 206. This is basically a name swap that gives riders an easier way to check the OFSC Interactive Trail Guide (ITG) for trail statuses. This fall, we just finished up a long overdue project to improve the ride and safety for those sledders that like to use the BEAST 206 (Ashton swamp trail). Let us know what you think.

I'd like to remind users of the BEAST 200 out of Stittsville that this is a unique trail as it is one of two multi-use trails we manage and use. This trail is controlled by the City of Ottawa and is a constant concern for us. Its yearly status is controlled by city council based on feedback from the public in the context of all shared trails within the city limits. The BEAST is nearing the end of a five year land use agreement with the city. We pay a nominal fee for the right to maintain an OFSC trail within the city limits. The city has been a great partner with the BEAST and this arrangement will continue on the condition that snowmobilers are courteous to other users of the TCT. As this is the only access to OFSC trails out of Stittsville, please be extra cautious here and pass along this message to fellow snowmobilers. Slow down to a crawl when passing other TCT users. We must police ourselves here, or we all lose access, plain and simple.

Volunteers continue to be the lifeblood of all of the snowmobile organizations across the province. If you cherish any of the trails mentioned above and want to see them exist in the future, please contact the BEAST volunteer coordinator, Wanda Bowes, volunteers@thebeast.ca and consider taking on a role working on some of the volunteer tasks required to keep them open. We have a need for various volunteers that maintain sections of trail, communications experts, landowner engagement, etc. Whatever your skillsets, we probably have a need. Step up to keep local Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs (OFSC) trails alive!!

E104A from Mississippi Lake to the village of Lanark that connects to District 6. If you take the BEAST 306 from the E104A to connect to West Carleton Snowmobile Trails Association (WCSTA), you will run through the village of Clayton where you will find friendly service, fuel, and snacks at the Clayton General Store. The BEAST 307 runs from the E104A at Boyd's Settlement to Innisville, where you can fuel up your trusty sled at Ultramar. There is also The Burger Hut Restaurant, where you can get warm and have a hot meal. Last, but not least, there is my favorite trail, the BEAST 308 which runs from Clayton to 3 mile Bay on White Lake. This is more of a remote trail which is 21 kms long through some very picturesque forest—make sure you stop at the 'Easton-Munro lookout' with a great view.

We have been busy with trail work this Fall with re-decking a bridge on the 308. West of Clayton, on trail 306 has had excavator work to improve trail and remove stumps. The BEAST 202 in Carleton Place just off the Trans Canada Trail has received some fill over the culverts to extend the season.


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Beauties of the BEAST - Julie-Anne Bedard

BEAST Trail Patrol - George Laight

The OFSC Trail Patrol Program commenced in 1983 at the inception of the user-pay system. Trail Patrol members volunteer their time and the use of their personal equipment to be snow-mobile ambassadors. These volunteers are clearly identifiable by their Trail Patrol vest, and each member also carries their Trail Patrol ID issues



ber also carries their Trail Patrol ID issued by the OFSC.

The BEAST Trail Patrol is currently comprised of about 30 members who patrol as their individual time permits during the week, weekends and evenings. Patrols generally consist of two Trail Patrol members but occasionally include four to eight members. We have members stationed all over the BEAST Trail system including Stittsville, Richmond, Almonte, Barrhaven, Carleton Place, and Munster Hamlet.

The primary function of Trail Patrol is public awareness and safety. Trail Patrol members' duties are centered around activity on OFSC Prescribed Trails and may be summarized into four broad categories:

- *On-Trail Support:* Trail Patrol members provide on-trail support in the form of maps, safety equipment, directions, help and updated information on trail conditions.
- *Safety Promotion:* Members promote safe riding by reminding snowmobilers of safe riding practices.
- *Risk Management:* Trail Patrol members actively identify and report unsafe or unusual conditions, remove branches and report safety issues to the club.

• *Landowner Agent:* As the agent for the landowner, a Trail Patrol has a responsibility to report trespasses to the Police.

Members of the Trail Patrol will be out again this season checking for permits, providing assistance, information and generally making sledders feel welcome on the trails. Our goal is to ensure the trails are safe and to promote the positive image of snowmobiling.

You can help too! If you can commit to 10 to 15 hours of riding over the winter season, we are always looking for new volunteers. Getting started involves an introduction session to the four categories shown above and some on the snow excursions to familiarize you with day-to-day activities on the trail. Try our Trails Weekend

The Try our Trails weekend will not be available in 2020. At the recent OFSC AGM, the OFSC let it be known that there would not be a Try Our Trails weekend. The decision comes from analyzing the conversion rate to full season passes. It helped in the early years of this program but recent years, not so much. So, if you, or someone you know, are sitting on the fence waiting for the free weekend, don't wait. Buy your trail pass online <u>www.ofsc.on.ca</u> and save yourself a lot of money.

OFSC Mobile APP

The mobile app that OFSC reintroduced last season is back with some upgrades. Those include much more detail with the zoom function, clearer resolution in general, updated trail network and the locate your friends function has been reworked so you can specify which friends you are riding with on that particular trip. These upgrades are but a few. There were 20,000 downloads last year and the OFSC is hoping for that many and more with the new updates. The cost for the app is still \$3.99 annually and is available through the APP store and google android.



Provincial Trail Guide

There will be no printed provincial trail guide from the OFSC. They found the cost to print being too expensive and believed the paper version of the trail guide is not utilized like the on line ITG (Interactive Trail Guide). Each district, however, still publishes their own. Upper Canada Snowmobile Region (UCSR) or District 1 will have a printed one available shortly. They can be picked up at local dealerships and known sponsors. The BEAST will also be printing our own guide and will be available at known sponsors and dealers.

Trail Permit Gift Coupons

The OFSC has negotiated with the MTO to introduce this new program. The problem in past is that many people spring order their new sleds for the following winter. So if they can't take delivery of that sled in October their early season pass purchase was not available to them, because the serial number and license numbers were obviously not released yet. So to help those buyers there will be a gift coupon available to purchase when you would typically buy your season pass.

The cost of the coupon coincides with the rate schedule published on our website as well as the OFSC. There are some conditions though. First of all, the coupon is just that, a coupon. It is not a gift card. Coupons can have an expiry date. Gift cards cannot expire. It's Ontario Law. Once it is purchased it belongs to the person who's name is registered on that coupon. It can be redeemed by that person at anytime up to the expiry date. We believe the expired date for this year is March 31, 2020. The coupons can be given as gifts if you like. Just remember there are no refunds. Once the coupon has expired that's it. No credit, refunds or exchanges.

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Driver Training - Debbie Lackey

Dale, Darin and Debbie will be back at it again this year!!!

Ontario Law requires any person 16 years and over to hold a valid Ontario Driver's Licence or a Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's Licence to operate a snowmobile on OFSC snowmobile trails. Persons 12 to 15 years old require a Motorized Snow Vehicle Operator's Licence.

The OFSC Driver Training Course is designed to emphasize the safe operation of motorized snow vehicles. Upon successful completion of the course, the participant will be legally eligible to drive a snowmobile in Ontario. The course costs \$40 with an extra fee for lunch (optional).

Given we have seen smaller classes over the past couple of years and the availability of an a new OFSC online course, we will be holding just one in class training session this season. Class sizes are normally full at around 20 students so please make sure you register. All spots are filled on a first come/first serve basis on registration night so don't be late as we are seeing some early interest already.

The in class course will be held on Saturday, 14 Dec 2019, from 8am-4pm at the Beckwith Recreation Complex, 1319, 9th Line Beckwith. Registration is Tuesday, 10 Dec 2019, 7-8 pm at the Lackey's, 1405 7th Line, Beckwith. NOTE: There is no registration on the day of the course. Each student must produce her or his birth certificate, or passport upon registration.
